A NUMBER by Caryl Churchill


Stony Brook University Theatre Arts Department will present **A NUMBER** by Caryl Churchill in Theatre 1 at the Staller Center on the Stony Brook University Campus November 2 – November 12, Thursdays - Saturdays at 8:00 PM and Sundays at 2:00 PM. A talkback session will follow the performance on Sunday, November 5.

A NUMBER, written in 2002, deals with the concept of human cloning. In this stark drama, a son confronts his emotionally-distant father and learns a horrifying truth about himself. The play explores the significance of individuality and early environmental influences in early childhood development, commonly called “nature vs. nurture.”

Steve Marsh, the director of **A NUMBER**, is a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Theatre Arts and an associate of the Alan Alda Center for Communicating Science, where he has led “a number” of communicating science workshops in improvisation and message design to hundreds of scientists at leading universities and science organizations across the country. He also served as literary manager for the Science Playwriting Competition at the Yang Institute for Theoretical Physics with his colleagues Chris Herzog and George Sterman.

“**A NUMBER** is one of my favorite plays written for two actors,” Marsh said recently. “Our production will create a number of intermezzos, or choreographed scenes, with a creative ensemble of student actors that brings the drama into the realm of science fantasy. Churchill’s play was inspired by issues of the morality and ethics of cloning; and while I love having the opportunity to bring science-related plays into the theatre, ultimately, at the core of this play is an intense, frightening and theatrical human drama.”

Steve Marsh is also an actor, dramaturg, playwright, author and poet, who has taught graduate and undergraduate courses in the disciplines of dramaturgy, play analysis, improvisation, acting and arts entrepreneurship. In 2014 he won the



Dean's Award for Outstanding Service as a Graduate Program Director at Stony Brook, and was a member of the 2014-15 prestigious Drama Desk Awards Nominating Committee in NYC. His book *Monologues from the Edge* will be published in the spring of 2018 by Applause Books.
