

BUDGET CUTS

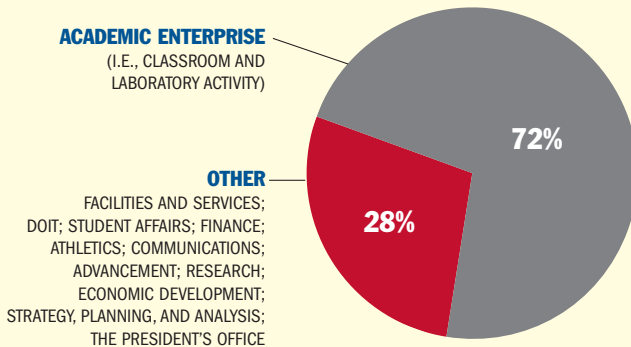
For 2008-09, Stony Brook has already sustained three rounds of budget cuts from the State totaling almost \$20 million.

For 2009-10, the Governor is pushing for more cuts for SUNY, which would mean an additional \$17 million cut for Stony Brook.

In addition, the State plans on sweeping 90 percent of the revenue from the SUNY tuition increase to address the State budget gap.

Increased State Support Mandated and contractual costs and funds needed to maintain the University's excellence should be funded by the State.

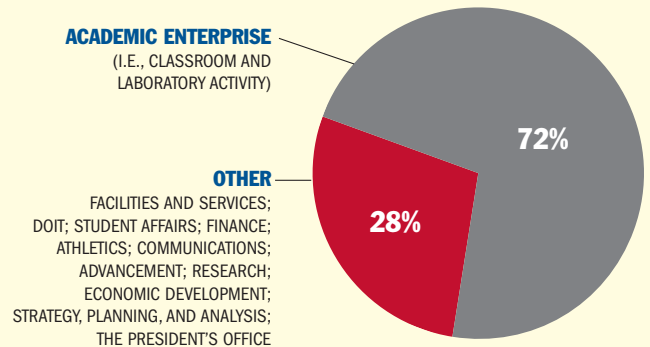
