Applying to Stony Brook Southampton

Stony Brook Southampton strongly encourages you to apply online. The online application can be found at www.stonybrook.edu/southampton, or you may use this paper application.

Freshman Applicants

• Regular Admission

Although there is no formal application deadline for Regular Admission, freshman applicants are advised to file their application for admission during the fall of their senior year.

• Early Action

Early Action is a non-binding application/notification program. Those who wish to apply for Early Action must submit their application for admission by November 15 and supporting documentation (high school transcripts and SAT/ACT scores) by December 15.

Transfer Applicants

Although there is no formal application deadline for most programs, transfer applicants are encouraged to submit applications by March 1 for fall

International Applicants

For the purpose of applying for admission to Stony Brook Southampton, you are considered an international student if you wish to study in the U.S. under a student (F1) visa or hold an F1, F2, J1, or J2 visa. International students should visit www.stonybrook.edu/southampton to apply online or to request international paper application materials and instructions. Those who wish to be considered for fall admission are required to complete their application for admission by April 1.

Those seeking admission for the spring semester are required to complete their application by October 1. Should you have questions, e-mail join_southampton@stonybrook.edu

Reviewing Your Application

Applicants are evaluated on an individual basis with careful consideration given to a range of factors, including the rigor of their high school curriculum, academic achievements, and personal strengths and talents.

- A high school diploma or equivalent (a Regents diploma is preferred for New York State residents).
- A strong high school academic program that includes four units of English, four units of social studies, three to four units of math, three to four units of science, and two or three units of a foreign language.
- Standardized test scores that indicate the promise of success in a rigorous undergraduate course of study. *Note:* Freshman applicants taking the ACT are required to submit the version with the optional writing section. SAT II scores in mathematics and a second area of the student's choice are recommended.
- Students who show evidence of leadership, special talents or interests, and other personal qualities through extracurricular activities, volunteer work, and other nonacademic pursuits may receive special consideration.
- Two recommendations from counselors and teachers may be requested by Stony Brook Southampton's Admissions Office.

Admission Decisions

Applicants for the fall semester are notified of their admission beginning February 1 and on a rolling basis thereafter. Early Action applicants are notified of their admission by January 1.

Applicants for the spring semester are notified beginning November 1 and on a rolling basis thereafter.

Stony Brook Southampton will be sending important admissions correspondence to the e-mail address you provide in your application. It is important that you provide us with a current e-mail address that you check frequently.

Step 1

Choose a Major

The State University of New York offers access to almost every field of academic or professional study somewhere within our 64-campus system—some 6,600 degree and certificate programs overall. For each college to which you apply, you may select a specific program of study or indicate that you do not wish to select one at this time by choosing curriculum code 0000 (undeclared major).

Currently, the following majors are available at Stony Brook Southampton: Environmental Studies, BA (curriculum code 0720); Marine Sciences, BS (curriculum code 0255); and Marine Vertebrate Biology, BS (curriculum code 1790).

10a–10b Residency

Residency affects eligibility for in-state tuition and EOP. Generally, students are considered state residents if their primary domicile (or, if dependent, that of their parents) is in New York for at least 12 months prior to enrollment. Otherwise, students are presumed to be out-of-state residents. Generally, only U.S. citizens (question 9a) and permanent residents are eligible for the New York State tuition rate. However, certain non-U.S. citizens who graduate from a New York high school and meet other requirements may qualify for the resident tuition rate. Please direct your questions concerning New York State residency to the Student Accounts Office.

20a–20b Felony/Dismissal Information (REQUIRED FOR ALL APPLICANTS) Even if you have never attended college, a response is required.

A felony in N.Y. State law is defined as a crime for which more than one year in prison may be imposed. The felony question applies if you have been convicted as an adult. If you have been adjudicated as having juvenile delinquent or youthful offender status, you are required to respond to the felony question 20a by indicating a response of no.

Suspension is defined as a sanction imposed for disciplinary reasons that results in a student leaving school for a fixed time period, less than permanently.

Dismissal from a college for disciplinary reasons is defined as permanent separation from an institution of higher education on the basis of conduct or behavior.

An affirmative response to either question will not automatically prevent admission, but you will be asked by your college choices to provide additional information. This information will be reviewed by a campus committee to ensure campus safety. Any falsification or omission of data may result in a denial of admission or dismissal.

27 Freshman/Transfer Designation

Freshman: For admission purposes, you are a freshman if you have not taken college-level courses since high school graduation. If you have taken college-level credits during high school, you are considered a freshman. Freshmen may also include students who have received the General Equivalency Diploma (GED) and adult learners entering higher education for the first time.

Transfer: For admission purposes, you are a transfer student if you have taken at least three credits of college-level work since high school graduation. College work taken before high school graduation does not apply.

If you are a transfer student seeking the fee waiver you must complete questions 40–51.

Early Action/Decision

Early Action (Page A5, Choosing a Campus Page)

Early Action is a non-binding early application/notification program for fall freshmen available at both Stony Brook Southampton and Stony Brook University. If you are accepted for Early Action, you need not withdraw your applications at other institutions. Indicate your desire to apply for Early Action where indicated in the "Choosing Campuses" section on page A5. Please note that you cannot apply for Early Action and EOP at the same time.

To apply for Early Action, an online application must be submitted on or before November 15. A paper application must be postmarked by November 15. Applications must be complete by December 15. If your application is complete by December 15 we will notify you of our decision by January 1.

Early Decision (Page A5, Choosing a Campus Page) The Early Decision Program is **not offered by Stony Brook Southampton.**

Step 3

Select a Payment Option

The non-refundable application fee is \$40 for each campus choice. The application fee is for processing services; it is non-refundable and independent of an admission decision or a decision to withdraw or decline an offer of acceptance. When you submit an application, you assume responsibility for prompt payment of all monies due. **Your application will not be processed until full payment or authorized fee waiver is received.**

To pay by MasterCard or VISA, please select the "Pay by Credit Card" option on the online application and complete the credit card information when prompted. If applying using the paper application, complete the credit card information on page A6. If applying online and paying by check, choose "Mail in Payment" and follow instructions. If applying on paper, attach a check to the application before mailing. Checks should be made payable to: Application Services Center or SUNY ASC. Please send only **one check** for total amount due (\$40 for one campus choice; \$80 for two campus choices, etc.). International applicants must pay in U.S. dollars drawn on a U.S. bank. Returned checks will be subject to an additional processing fee of \$20. All appeals for refunds must be put in writing to the Director of the Application Services Center.

Both freshman and transfer applicants to the Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) may waive the fee by submitting a fee waiver request. If you are ineligible, or if your college choice does not offer EOP, you will be billed for the fee.

Step 4

Request Transcripts

If you are applying to SUNY as a freshman, please send one transcript per campus choice to the ASC along with your completed application and application fee. If your transcripts are not available at the time you submit your application, or if you apply online, please have your transcripts forwarded directly to each campus to which you apply.

If you are applying to SUNY as a transfer student, please note that academic transcripts are required for **all** colleges you attended, whether or not you received credit. Please send a copy of all transcripts directly to each college choice to which you applied.

If you are transferring from another SUNY school, please request a General Education Transcript Addendum be sent with your official transcript.

Transfer applicants earning less than the equivalent of one year of study (generally 24–30 credit hours), should arrange for their former high school to send transcripts directly to the colleges to which they are applying.

Step 6

Check Your Application Status

To check the status of your application online, visit www.suny.edu/student/appstatus

The system will verify that your application was received at the ASC and confirm your campus and program choice(s). You will also be provided with specific contact information should you have questions.

Information for School Counselors and College Advisors

Complete the academic information requested on page A6 of the application, along with your signature. Please enter only one rank and academic average and provide a transcript for each college choice. All six pages of the application should be mailed together.

If paying the application fee would present a financial hardship to this applicant (including EOP applicants) and the applicant's family, please submit a fee waiver request (see page A6). The student may be requested to document his/her financial situation. Applications will not be processed until full payment or authorized fee waiver is received.

Frequently Asked Questions

What happens to my application after it is received at the SUNY Application Services Center (ASC) in Albany?

The ASC will prepare one application for each of your college choices and mail it to the college along with your transcript. Once your application is sent to the college(s), the ASC will notify you that your application has been processed. Admission decisions are made and communicated by each campus to which you apply.

What is the application fee to SUNY?

The non-refundable application fee is \$40 for each campus choice. Please send only one check for the total amount due made payable to the Application Services Center or SUNY ASC. The application will not be processed until full payment or authorized fee waiver is received.

What is the online application status checker?

The application status checker is a tool that confirms receipt of your (online or paper) application by the Application Services Center (ASC) in Albany. By entering your Application ID (typically your social security number) and birth date (exactly as you provided them to us) you can see which campuses you applied to, academic program chosen, and approximate date by which the campuses should receive your application.

Within a few days of the ASC receiving your paper application or submitting your online application, check your application status at www.suny.edu/appstatus

Will my admission decision be affected if I take the SAT I or ACT more than once?

No, Stony Brook Southampton will consider the highest scores you have achieved.

Does Stony Brook Southampton accept AP or college credits taken during high school?

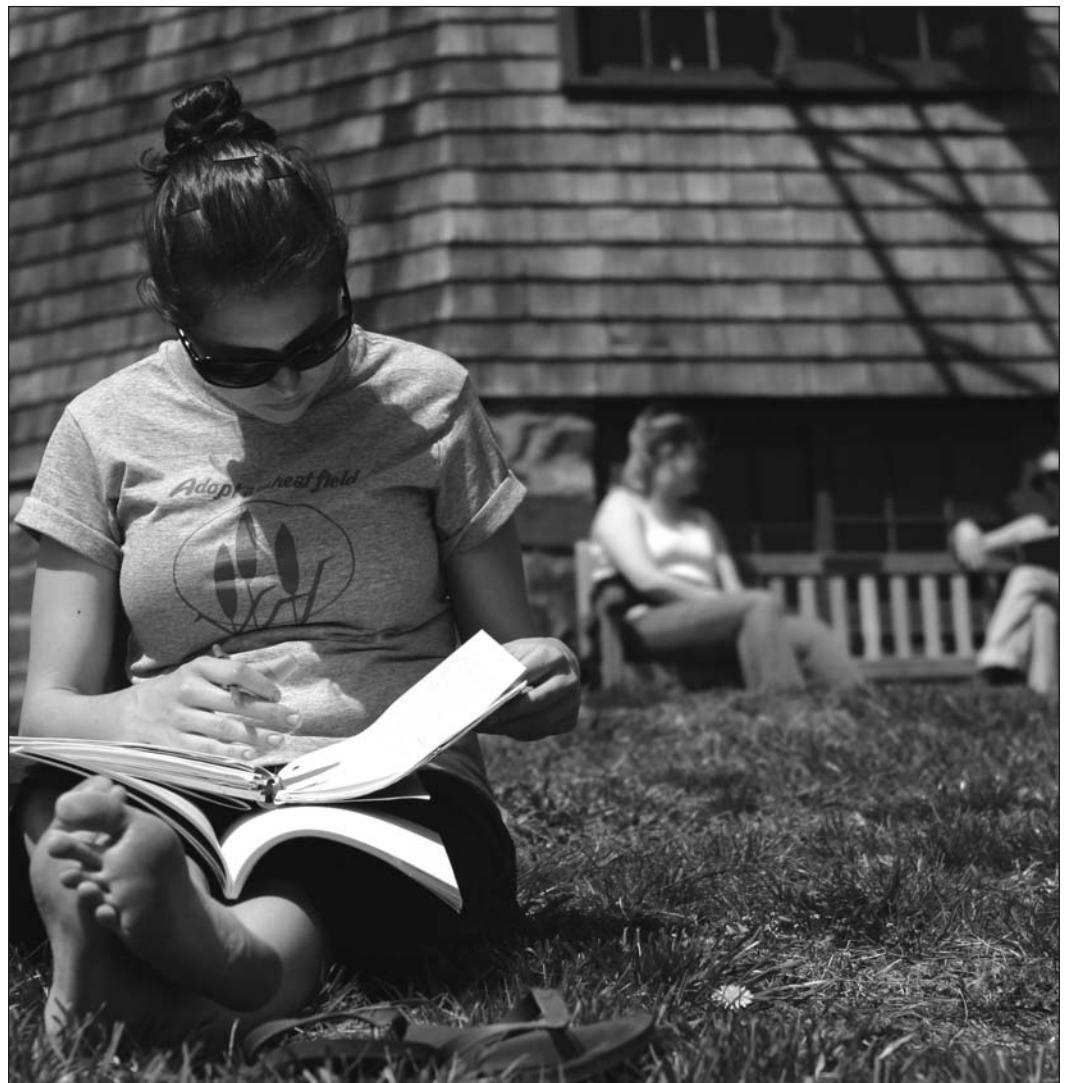

Costs and Financial Aid Information

How Financial Aid Works

Tuition and fees are already low compared to other colleges and universities. However, financial aid is available for students who are unable to pay college costs. The table below shows the approximate cost to attend either Stony Brook or Stony Brook Southampton for one academic year. Based on state and federal criteria, Stony Brook University's Financial Aid Office will determine your eligibility for assistance. Students themselves and their families are considered the first source of funding to meet college costs. The financial aid process uses a standard method to determine how much a family should contribute to a student's education.

Types of Financial Aid

Financial aid programs include academic scholarships, need-based grants, student and parent loans, and employment. Both the federal and state government offer financial aid opportunities. In addition, other sources of assistance may include scholarships from private organizations, foundations, fraternal groups, and SUNY campus sources.

Tuition, Fees, and Other Costs

Total costs vary depending on full-time or part-time enrollment, program of study, housing accommodations, meal plan, personal expenses, and other individual factors. Tuition rates are higher for students who are not New York State residents (see chart below). Contact the Student Accounts Office for details about residency requirements.

For students taking fewer than 12 semester hours (part-time study), New York State resident tuition is \$181 per credit hour for baccalaureate degree programs.

Time Option Payment Plan

Stony Brook University offers the Time Option Payment Plan (TOPP) to students at both Stony Brook and Stony Brook Southampton. This plan allows students and parents to make equal and consecutive payments throughout the semester rather than paying the balance of the bill up front. Enrollment forms for TOPP will be sent with the student's first bill. For more information, please contact the Student Accounts Office at (631) 632-BILL.

How New Students Apply for Financial Aid

1. All students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

- If you have Internet access, you can file the FAFSA online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Stony Brook University's Federal School Code is 002838. FAFSA applicants who are New York State residents and who plan to attend a college in New York State will automatically be directed to apply for TAP on the Web. Stony Brook University's State Code is 0875.
- Complete the FAFSA after January 1, 2008, even if you have not yet filed your 2007 tax returns. Use estimates if necessary.
- If you are unable to file online, you can obtain the FAFSA application from your high school counseling office. Be sure to meet all deadlines.

2. Investigate other sources of aid. Several free scholarship search services are available online.

3. Keep a file of records and copies of applications.

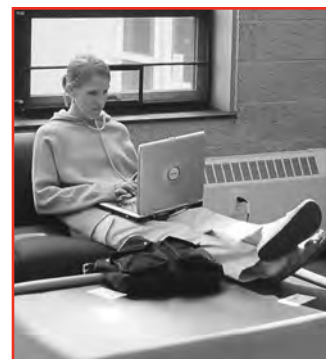
