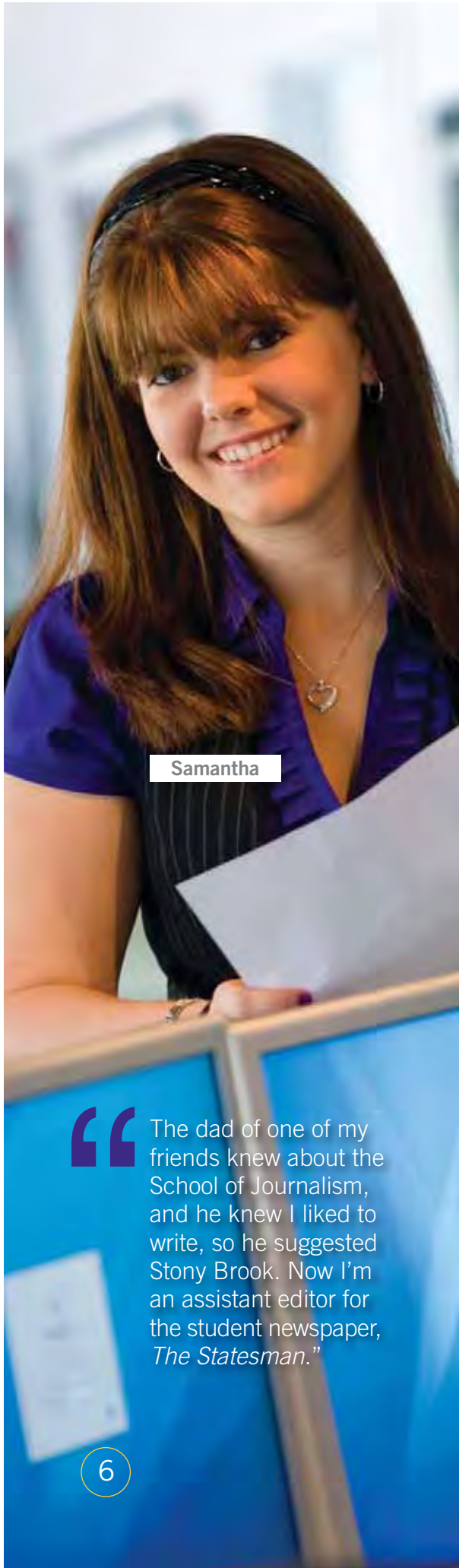
An ideal location

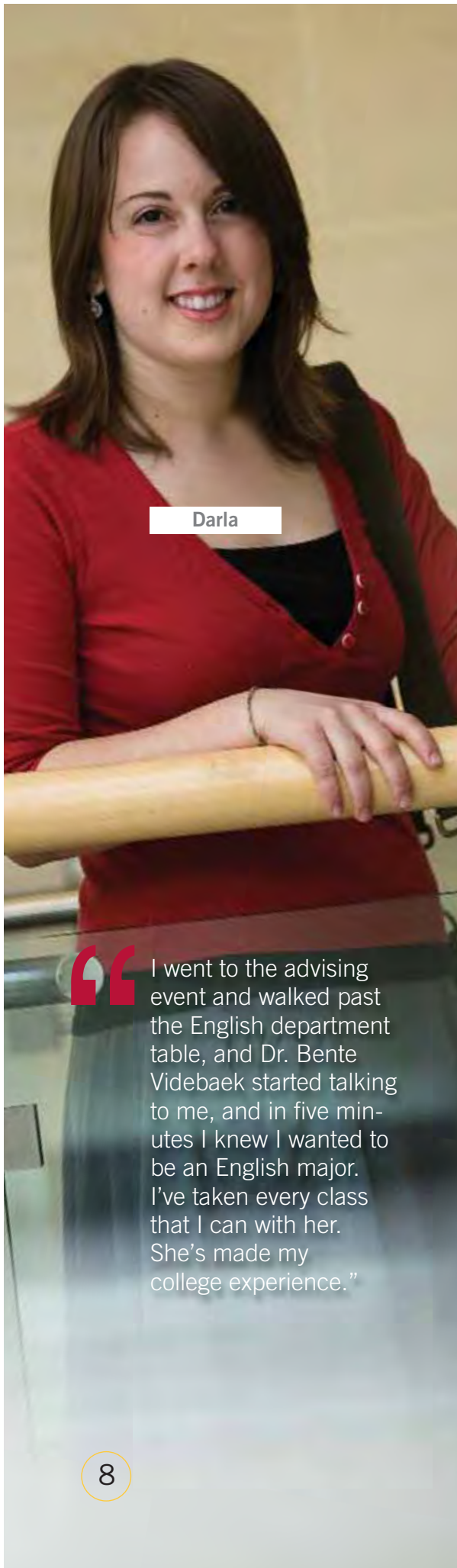

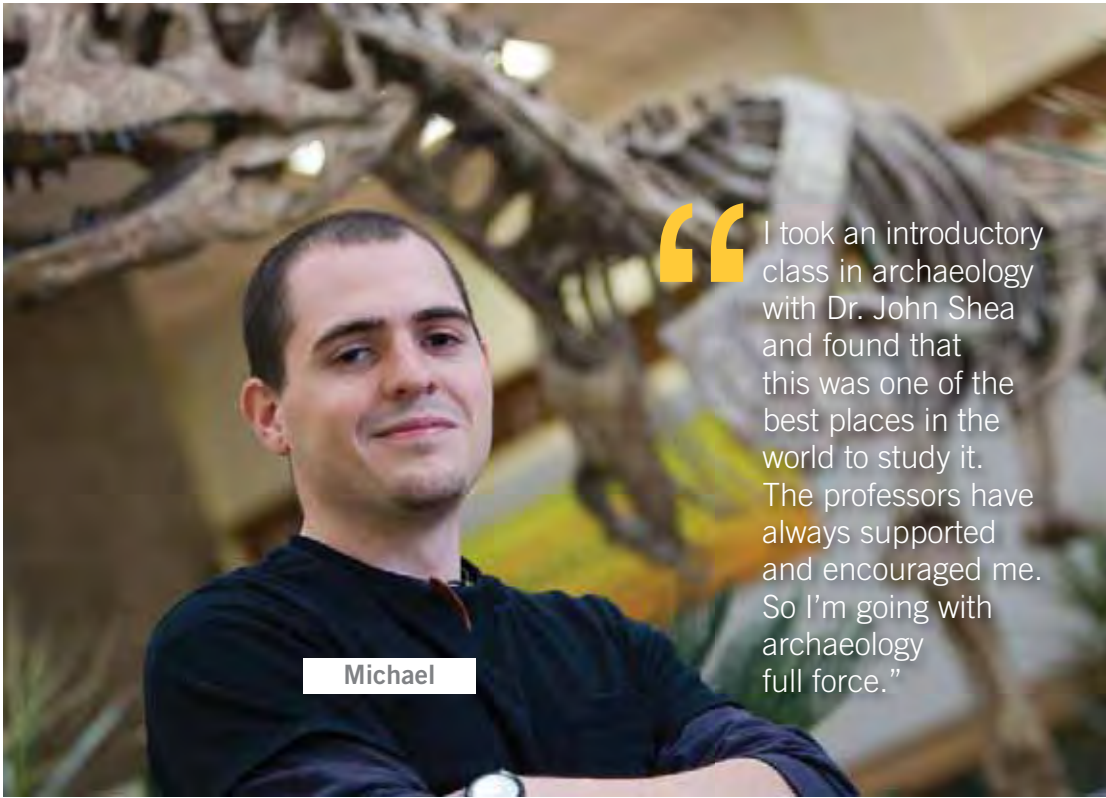
Professors who inspire

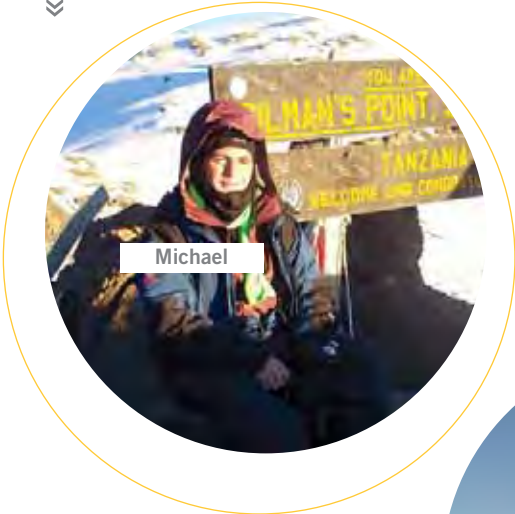

I like it when I’m standing in front of the class, and I see a student push back in his chair, and his eyes track from me to somewhere up in the air. That’s a ‘tell.’ He’s thinking. He just heard something and now he’s turning it around in his head, trying to relate it to some other aspect of his experience.”
