## Perpetrators, Resisters, and Victims: Medical Eponyms from the Nazi Era

## **Lester Paldy**

Hans Asperger, a pediatrician whose name has long been associated with autism, sent children to a Nazi killing center thinly disguised as a hospital. His eponym has been properly replaced by "autism spectrum disorder." For the past 25 years, medical associations have worked to replace eponyms associated with Nazi physicians and accord more recognition to eponyms of courageous physicians who resisted the Nazis. This talk reviews a relatively little-known part of the history of medicine for current and emerging generations of medical professionals.

Lester Paldy is Distinguished Service Professor Emeritus in the Department of Pathology and Department of Technology and Society, and Distinguished Visiting Scholar in the Center for Medical Humanities, Compassionate Care, and Bioethics at Stony Brook where he has taught since 1967. He served on U.S. delegations in Geneva and at the UN negotiating nuclear weapon treaties. Service with teams working to limit the spread of weapons of mass destruction led to Nuremberg trial precedents defining crimes against humanity and, in turn, to a review of egregious Nazi violations of medical ethics. He is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and a former Marine officer.
