HGSA Statement on the Current Protests

In light of recent events, the History Graduate Student Association (HGSA) commits its support to the Black Lives Matter Movement. The murders of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, Nina Pop, Ahmaud Arbery, and many other black people by police and white vigilantes in the United States are intolerable hate crimes that the HGSA refuses to condone or excuse.

As practitioners of history, we understand that these present-day acts of white supremacy are continuations of centuries of violence towards black, brown, and indigenous people. We know that the institution of policing was established to regulate black and brown bodies; the problem is not "one bad apple," but is rather a historical, systemic issue. We demand the arrest of all officers and individuals who perpetuate racial violence, and we agitate for the redistribution of billions of dollars from police department budgets to local communities. Finally, we call on SUNY to disband the New York State University Police and redistribute its resources. University police departments were only established in the 1960s to silence student unrest, and our voices will no longer be quieted.

The HGSA supports everyone who has taken a stand at the front lines of the protests. As graduate students, we are committed to learning, to admitting to our own faults, and to growing and challenging ourselves; we ask that faculty say and do the same. History graduate students



must work to elevate more people of color and women to leadership positions within the HGSA. Likewise, History faculty must endeavor to add more women and people of color to their ranks and their curricula, and to make sure that "diversity work" is not delegated exclusively to female faculty and students of color.
